The Tradition of Szopki in Poland and Polanki

Since the Middle Ages in Poland, various kinds of crèches, or *szopki*, were carried from house to house by Christmas carolers. These took on a special character in the city of Kraków, where carpenters and masons used the winter months to build fanciful structures that incorporated elements from Kraków's architectural monuments, such as St. Mary's Church and Wawel Castle. The *szopki* are made of wood, plywood, cardboard and decorated with colorful tinfoil.

Making *szopki* is a tradition that has been passed on from generation to generation. Every year, the Historical Museum of the City of Kraków organizes a competition in the Market Square, where master craftsmen and amateurs alike present their creations for judging in various categories. The 2020 competition, although held virtually, still attracted 87 entries in several categories, including families and children.

Polanki owns two prizewinning Kraków *szopki*. One, made by Marzena Krawczyk, received a second prize in the 2011 competition. It is lighted from the inside and features a revolving *lajkonik* (mythical Tatar horseman) figure. The other was a third prize winner made by Włodzimierz Łesyk in the late 1970s. The *szopka* by Marzena Krawczyk is pictured on the left.

Epiphany is a big celebration in many places in Poland, featuring street parades, caroling of songs, and reenactments of the Nativity scene. The street parades usually involve a procession of the three wise men who give people candy and small treats in some towns and cities. Local parish priests preach about the significance of Epiphany and many houses are blessed.

To symbolize the Star of Bethlehem that was seen above the manger on the night of the Jesus' birth, which led the Wise Men to the newborn King, young boys would dress in long, white pants with robes of black paper and paper crowns on their heads. One of them carried the star on a long pole lit from within by a candle so that it could be seen at night. These carolers would walk throughout the village singing carols telling the story of the birth of Christ and the Three Kings,



accompanied by a musical instrument. Beginning at the manor house or church rectory, they would then stop at various homes, standing before a window to sing a carol. After obtaining permission to enter the house, the boys would then continue to sing both religious and popular Christmas carols.



The *Three Kings* or Three Wise Men are an integral part of the Christian church and their name day is celebrated on January 6. In Catholic homes, the local parish priest writes the initials K+M+B for Kaspar, Melchior and Balthazar, in chalk at the top of entrance doors. Some people place above their doors three small boxes, each containing water, incense, and chalk in memory of the wise kings' gifts to Jesus. Another custom is taking small boxes containing chalk, a gold ring, incense, and a piece of amber to be blessed in church, in memory of the gifts of the Magi.

In the mountains, people may bring chalk to church on this feast day to be blessed. Upon their return, they write these initials on the door themselves, not to be disturbed until the following year. These initials written with blessed chalk, along with the palms from Palm Sunday and blessed candles from Candlemas Day, together are a force to avert disaster.

Epiphany was a holiday that was cancelled during the Communist regime in Poland, but it was restored as an official public holiday across the country in 2011. *Three Kings day* is also the traditional day to take down the Christmas tree decorated on Christmas Eve. [*Polish Three Kings Cake*]



2020 Had Some Bright Spots!

Yes, 2020 was a year that we all wanted to end, looking forward to a brighter new year when life returns to normal, although most likely it will be a new and different normal. Still, 2020 had some bright spots. For Polanki, through the magic technology of Zoom, we were able to resume monthly meetings, see each other's faces and hear each other's voices, reminding us of the value of our shared commitment to Polish culture and friendship. A vaccine is on the way and spring will be here in less than 100 days! As we



enter 2021 with renewed hope for a happier and healthier year, these bright spots are a reminder of the commitment and positive role of Polanki in our lives.

Active Member Joanne Barndt shared these reflections on the last year: As 2020 comes to a close, my thoughts have drifted back to the book we read for the Polanki Book Group, "The Zoo Keeper's Wife," and a book I read as a child, "The Diary of Anne Frank," and the movies about WWII. This year has been hard, especially not being able to hold hands or give hugs or have as many people as we would like in one room. But I am grateful to be living in 2020 and not 1940. While Anne Frank had to be perfectly still during the day, unable to communicate with her school friends, I am calling people on the telephone, emailing people on my computer, participating in Polanki and other meetings over Zoom, and smiling to myself that I did not have to drive in the dark or the snow.

Unlike the Poles who were living in cages in a zoo, I am living in a safe, warm apartment surrounded by my books and music CD's, the TV, and a kitchen full of goodies. Thanks to Social Security and Medicare, I do not have to worry about how I am going to pay for food, rent or health care, and I can talk to my doctor without ever leaving my apartment thanks to telehealth.

As Anne Frank looked out her window at the birds flying freely longing to be free herself, I am walking in the park enjoying the fresh air away from auto emissions. And while those in hiding were wondering what was happening in the world beyond their hiding place, I am bombarded by 24-hour news and able to vote by absentee ballot in a free world. In the '40s, no one knew how long the war would continue, but I know that I am getting my vaccination next month and at this time next year, will be looking toward and working toward a brighter future for everyone.

Active Member Kathy Wieczorek also shared some positive thoughts about 2020 and Polanki: At the April 2020 Polanki Board meeting, Camille received approval to organize a development committee, known as the Development Team. The volunteer members are Bernie Jendrzejczak, Sandy JeT'aime, Susan Mikoś, Marjorie Piechowski, Camille Shaw, Anne Wal, Kathy Wieczorek (chairperson), and Jean Wroblewski. In October and December, the Development Team met via Zoom to discuss ideas and suggestions to support Polanki's mission during these challenging times. Little did we know at the time the Development Team would be writing a CARES Act grant application in December and would successfully receive \$8,538 to support Polanki. The grant was awarded by a Milwaukee County program, Imagine Milwaukee, that coordinated the distribution of federal covid relief funding for local arts and cultural groups.

For 20 years, We Energies Foundation has been supporting Polanki through corporate matching of my artisan sales benefiting Polanki's fundraising events in the Milwaukee area. More importantly, the Foundation has continued to support Polanki during this pandemic with a quarterly donation of \$500 to provide some financial relief for its fixed operating expenses. Since most of our regular fund-raising activities were canceled because of the virus, these examples of financial assistance have helped to manage our ongoing expenses.

During October's celebration of Polish American Heritage Month, my hand-crafted Polish Heritage Pandemic Face Masks were distributed free to Polanki members at the Polanki Library and through the postal service. It was great to network with enthusiastic members as they selected masks from a variety of Kaszubian and Lowicz folk art designs and traditional floral fabrics. A signature mask from red and white striped fabric was crafted to resemble the male Kraków regional costume dance trousers. The red and white striped *Polska* mask was a hit with the guys too.

In November, a caseload of We Energies annual cookie books was distributed to members. Christmas, winter holiday-themed and Polish heritage facial masks were available for purchase and continue to be available through the Polanki Facebook page. This event was another opportunity to socialize in person (wearing masks and social distancing) at the Polanki Library.

Overall, Polanki members have displayed their traditional strength and resilience during this challenging year and look forward with optimism to a better 2021.
