Revision of Polanki Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation

About a year ago President Camille Shaw appointed a committee to review and revise Polanki's Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation. These documents had not been revised in many years and needed to be brought up to date.

Committee members were Denna Flemming, Tamara Johnston, Susan Mikoś, and Marjorie Piechowski, committee chair. After many meetings and detailed review of the existing documents, the committee presented the revisions to the Polanki Board of Directors. The Board carefully reviewed and considered the revisions and unanimously approved them at the March 29, 2021 board meeting.

Major changes to the bylaws included tightening language and format, clarifying officer eligibility and duties, eliminating the prescribed meeting day, and revising the current treasurer duties into two positions: Managing Treasurer and Investment Treasurer. The committee also recommended changing the Auditing Committee to the Financial Review Committee, a more accurate description of its role. The Articles of Incorporation were updated to meet current language and regulations.

The next step is approval by Polanki's voting members (Active and Life Members). The original and revised documents have been sent to all Polanki members along with this newsletter.

Approval of the revised documents will be requested at the May membership meeting. In the meantime, members are asked to review the changes and direct any questions to the committee members or to the Polanki president.

POLSKIE TRADYCJE WIELKANOCNE

Wielkanoc to czas Zmartwychwstania Pańskiego. Polskie tradycje, które rozpoczynają to święto to święcenie pokarmów, zwane potocznie "święconką." W Wielką Sobotę tradycyjnie przynosimy w koszyku do święcenia: baranka - symbolizującego Chrystusa Zmartwychwstałego, jajka – symbol nowego życia, zmartwychwstania i zwycięstwa Chrystusa nad śmiercią, chleb – symbol Ciała Jezusa Chrystusa, a także godności człowieka, któremu nigdy nie powinno zabraknąć chleba, wędlin, kiełbasy, wody i ciasta, które są symbolem dobrobytu oraz ofiary baranka. Koszyczek ozdobiony jest bukszpanem. Po święceniu, tradycyjnie trzeba obejść z koszykiem trzy razy dookola domu, aby odstraszyć "złe duchy."

"Święconkę" wykorzystujemy w czasie uroczystego śniadania Wielkanocnego, w Wielką Niedzielę rano, kiedy po modlitwie, składamy sobie życzenia, dzieląc się święconym jajkiem. Pozostałą część święconki używamy do krajanki do żurku i na stół Wielkanocny, na którym zazwyczaj są: sałatka jarzynowa lub inne sałatki, jajka w majonezie, chrzan, wędlina, serki i oczywiście ciasto. Drugi dzień świąt to tradycyjny Śmigus Dyngus, czyli oblewanie się wodą, szczególnie popularne wśród młlodych.

POLISH EASTER TRADITIONS

Easter is the time of Jesus Christ's Resurrection. The Polish tradition that starts this feast is the blessing of food, commonly referred to as "święconką." On Holy Saturday, people bring decorated baskets filled with a lamb (butter, sugar or cake in the lamb shape or a ceramic one) symbolizing the Risen Christ; colored eggs or "pisanki," symbols of new life, resurrection and Christ's victory over death; bread, the symbol of the Body of Christ as the "Bread of Life" as well as the dignity of people who should never lack bread; cold cuts, kiełbasa, salt and pepper mixed together as a symbol of purification, water and cakes, which are symbols of prosperity as well as the sacrifice of the Lamb. The basket is decorated with boxwood, flowers and covered with a linen embroidered cloth. After the blessing ceremony, there is a tradition to walk the basket around the house three times to scare off the "evil spirits."

The blessed food, "święconką," is eaten for a festive Easter breakfast after prayers are said and then everyone exchanges Easter wishes while sharing the blessed eggs. Some of the foods are used to make the traditional Easter soup, "żurek," and also are part of the big Easter meal along with Polish vegetable salad as well as other salads, hard boiled eggs in mayonnaise, horseradish—a reminder of the bitterness of Christ's sacrifice, cold cuts, cheeses and of course a variety of cakes, including "mazurek." The second day of Easter, i.e., Easter Monday, is called Śmigus Dyngus, which is a day of sprinkling each other with water—particularly popular among the young people.

We wish our entire Polanki family a very blessed, delicious and peaceful Easter. Smacznego Jajka!

Easter Mazurek

Mazurek, whether homemade or purchased at the many bakeries in Poland, is considered an Easter splurge after 40 days of fasting for Lent. That might be why this cake is tooth-achingly sweet. Another reason is that Holy Week, the period from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday, is a busy one in a Polish household.

The interior and exterior of the house are cleaned from top to bottom. In the small town of Chocholow, on the outskirts of Zakopane in southern Poland, the homes are made of beautiful wood and, every spring, the women of the household get out their brushes and pails and scrub the exterior of their homes until the wood is white.

Easter cooking and baking are often done during Holy Week but with all of the other chores to complete, Easter

desserts naturally devolved into ones that could be prepared well in advance of Easter Sunday without getting stale. Enter the mazurek, often made with an abundance of dried fruits to keep it moist.



History of Mazurek

It is speculated that mazurek, the cake, was inspired by sweet Turkish desserts that came to Poland via the spice trade route from Turkey in the early 17th century, but its origin is uncertain. Russians are also fond of mazurki (plural for mazurek), but they can be entirely different from the Polish form. Often, they are made with hazelnut flour or meal and, so, are gluten-free.

Mazurek starts off with a shortbread-like crust, which may be topped with a layer or combination of layers consisting of fruit jam, dried fruit, a thick caramel, chocolate, or nuts. Like so many foods in Poland, the tarts are beautifully decorated, in patterns, a pussy willow design (a symbol of spring and used in places of palms on Palm Sunday), or with "Wesołego Alleluja" (Happy Easter) piped in meringue or chocolate ganache.

INGREDIENTS

SHORTCRUST PASTRY:

2 cups (300g) all-purpose flour 2/3 cup butter (150g) butter 7 tablespoons (80g) sugar 1 egg 1 – 2 tablespoons milk

TOPPINGS:

heaping 1/2 cup (150g) jam, preferably sour, such as plum, marmalade, or black currant

1 can Dulce de leche (400 or 500g), or 1 can sweet condensed milk almonds, chocolate, dried apricots for decoration

INSTRUCTIONS:

If you are using a can of sweet condensed milk, it should be cooked in a pot of water on a low heat for 3 hours. The can MUST be covered by water the entire time; this will caramelize the sweetened condensed milk

Preheat oven to 350 F (180 C).

Combine the flour, butter, and sugar until uniform.

Add in the egg and milk; work the dough by hand or using a food processor until it comes together; it will be crumbly.

Form into a disk and wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least one hour.

Roll out the dough directly on parchment paper to a rectangle, slightly larger than a 9 x 13 inch pan and trim the dough to the size of your pan.

Place the dough, on the parchment, into the pan.

If you're making a free form shape, such as an egg, roll out the dough on the parchment, use two round shapes, one larger than the other to get the rounded top and bottom of your egg, trim using straight lines between the two arcs to create your egg shape, move dough on the parchment to a baking sheet.

Roll the dough you've trimmed off into long ropes; use these to create an edge around your pastry as dams to hold in the filling.

Cut out a rabbit or chick for decoration; small items will brown more quickly.

Spread jam on the dough.

Bake in a preheated oven until golden brown, approximately 25 minutes and cool.

Spread with dulce de leche or caramelized sweetened condensed milk and decorate as desired.


