Polanki and the Conservancy for Healing and Heritage

Founded in 2003, the Conservancy for Healing and Heritage occupies 36 acres of woodland, wetland and lake in Franklin, Wisconsin. It adjoins the Reiman Cancer Center, to the west, and the Polish Center of Wisconsin, to the east. It was established by representatives of both entities, under a charter providing that the natural environment will be maintained in perpetuity.



Because of the Conservancy's connection with Polish heritage, Polanki decided to support it by sponsoring the Entrance Garden, which would be recognized with a small individual sign. Polanki's Board agreed that it would be appropriate to incorporate some Polish poetry lines on the theme of nature.

While there is a rich body of Polish poetry dealing with nature, it wasn't easy to find just a few lines that could stand on their own. After much searching, Roma Numrych came up with the perfect poem – just four lines long, and titled "In the Woods." It was written by a Polish woman named Maria Czerkawska, whose life story is very touching and has special meaning for a group like Polanki. A story about the poet follows on the next page.

Maria Czerkawska was born in Bezmiechowa Górna, in the southeastern corner of Poland. Her parents belonged to the impoverished nobility, and she grew up in the countryside, on the family estate. She always had a special feeling for nature, and especially for trees and forests. Her mother died when she was four years old. She and her younger brother, Józef, were brought up by their father.

Educated at home, she was a voracious reader of Polish literature and poetry. She attended the Jagiellonian University in Kraków for two semesters, but returned home when her father fell ill. He died a year later. Maria was left to take care of her brother and assumed the management of her family estate. She also wrote poetry and published her first collection of poems in 1908.

At the outbreak of World War I, Maria left the countryside for two years. In 1916, she returned home and married Gustaw Mauthner, a chemist. She found the estate in ruins but rebuilt it. She lived there until the Second World War,

engaging in forestry, beekeeping and herbal remedies. She continued to write poetry, which she published in various periodicals and later in several small volumes. In September 1939, she and her husband accompanied her brother to Lwów, where he went for medical treatment. Her brother died soon after, and her husband disappeared when World War II broke out. She returned to Kraków, where she worked in a bookshop. She continued to write and began to write also for children, sharing her knowledge of life and work in the countryside, and writing with quiet sensitivity about the beauty of nature, especially her beloved forests. One of her poems and drawings about apple trees is shown here.



In 1957 Maria was seriously injured in a road accident and was confined to a wheelchair for the rest of her life. She lived in Kraków and continued to write until her last years, when she could no longer see. An anthology of her collected poems was published in Kraków a year before her death.

Throughout her difficult life, Maria Czerkawska found solace in close contact with nature, especially trees, but also with birds and wildlife. She had an intimate knowledge of the natural world, in which she worked for her whole life, where she rested, and which gave her healing in difficult moments. Until the end of her life she maintained a cheerful spirit and a friendly smile. An engaging storyteller, she drew in both young and old.

She died on November 2, 1973 in Kraków and is buried in the Salwator Cemetery there.
