Carol Bialek December 5, 1934-January 1, 2023 Polanki Sustaining Member

Carol Louise Bialek (nee Wisynski) found peace January 1, 2023 at the age of 88. Lovingly survived by her husband of 60 years, John. Beloved mom of Jackie Bialek. Dear sister of Doris (Fred) Reichert and sister in-law (and cousin) of Marlene Bialek and grand-dog Kooper. Carol was loved and will be remembered by other relatives and friends.

Carol was the valedictorian of the January 1953 class of South Division High School in Milwaukee. She then went on to attend Marquette University where she graduated with honors in 3 ½ years in 1956 with a degree in Medical Technology. After graduation she began her life-long love of travel and was able to visit many states as well as Mexico before finding the love of her life and getting married in May of 1963. Carol worked in the lab of the city of Milwaukee until she was blessed with her only child, a daughter, in 1966. She then devoted the next 10+ years of her life being a stay at home mom which included becoming involved with girl scouts, PTA and volunteering at many school activities. When she did go back to work, she settled in at the labs for the Milwaukee County Medical Complex where she stayed until her retirement. Along the way she was able to fulfill a lifelong dream of visiting Hawaii and continued to see the US on many family car trips.

Carol was very proud of her Polish ancestry and was a member of Polanki, the Polish Women's Cultural Club of Milwaukee, for many years where she held the title of historian for several of those years. That role was perfect for her since she was able to incorporate her love of photography. Her retirement years gave her an opportunity to travel to Poland twice and use the Polish language that she had studied over her whole life.

Carol also had a passion for gardening and maintained a large vegetable garden at each of the 3 homes her and John shared through the years. Nothing ever went to waste, the bounty of the harvest was shared with family and friends or preserved by freezing and canning. Carol endured multiple health issues over the last 20 years of her life. She was a survivor of both breast cancer and leukemia.

Our Family Christmas Party at the Polish Center

Every year for at least the past fifty years, my extended family – brothers, sister, in-laws, grandchildren, nieces, nephews and, now, great nieces and nephews - about 65 of us - have gathered on a December Sunday before Christmas. We outgrew our houses so now, for at least the past ten years, we come to the Polish Center. We use nine tables in the Veterans' Room for eating our brunch and omelets, for singing traditional Christmas Carols (always ending with our mother's favorite, "Dzisiaj Betlejem." Then someone dons a red hat to play Santa and passes out one gift to all the youngsters.

But because of covid, we have been unable to have our party for the last 2 years, so we actually haven't been together for almost 3 full years. We all were worried that it might have to be postponed again this year with rampant flu, RSV and covid rearing their ugly heads. But it happened! In all our years, we all have become



accustomed to walking into the big hall for the buffet. The omelet station is set up right in front of the tree and seeing the large Polanki decorated Christmas tree and the szopka on the table in front of the big windows is a highlight. In not seeing them for several years, they took on a new, warm meaning for us this year. They made us feel at "home."

But also, there was something new this year because we had five new babies added to the mix, ranging from 4 years old to 1 month old. They added a new dimension to the party, but in particular, when they saw the tree their eyes widened and were filled with that glowing childish awe. When they moved to the szopka they were just as fascinated. Its doors are right in front of them at eye level. Every mom had to be on guard to stop the little fingers from reaching up to touch everything. Watching them as they saw everything for the first time made me appreciate our Polish decorated tree, our customs and Polanki's work even more.

The Polish main location is in Siedlee county at an estate named Reymontówka. In the summer, camps are held at Remontówka and have also been held in Zakopane. The camps run through the summer in two-week increments. However, the camps were put on hold for the last two years because of covid. During the school year volunteers work in the local rural schools. Students are evaluated for their English abilities and then put into small groups accordingly. At camp, the morning activities consist of games, puzzles, walks, etc. The main idea is to get students to speak with native English speakers. Afternoons are for fun.
